# **Delegate Update**

Please see the following updates from the APWA Alabama Chapter.

This year our chapter reached a milestone at the national APWA level. We were found to be eligible and have submitted our first Presidential Award for Chapter Excellence (PACE) application for calendar year 2023 for consideration at the National level. This award is intended to recognize APWA chapters for contributions made to positively impact their membership, profession, and community. This award recognizes chapters that demonstrate this accomplishment in any given year.

APWA chapters with less than 500 members are eligible to submit a nomination for consideration when:

- All required fiscal year-end financial reporting was submitted by July 31 of the nomination time period of January 1 through December 31, (2023); AND 1099 information was submitted by January 15, of (2024);
- If chapter membership is 500 members or less, the chapter has submitted one national award nomination in any category. Our Chapter submitted the City of Auburn's Town Creek Inclusive Playground project for consideration. This project was featured in our last Chapter newsletter.

PACE award recipients are selected by a panel comprised of APWA's current President, President Elect, and three most recent Past Presidents.

Applications are evaluated on four (4) categories: Membership, Service to Chapter Members, Advancement of Public Works and Sustainability, and Service to the Community.

With PWX so close to home this year, we have our fingers crossed that the selection committee finds our application worthy of the PACE. If we are successful, the chapter receives a certificate and chapter banner patch and are recognized at the Awards Recognition Ceremony during PWX. Winning chapters are featured in future APWA publications.

I look forward to seeing many of you in July at the APWA/ASCE Summer Conference at Perdido and in September at PWX in Atlanta.

# SPOTLIGHT – ELM STREET PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE

ATHENS, AL



The Elm Pedestrian Bridge, now complete, has been a wonderful addition to Athens. Please see the article below written by <u>J.R. Tidewell from The News Courier</u> that explained the need and process for this project.



Foot traffic on Elm Street has been an issue in Athens for some time. Many pedestrians like to traverse the area, either going to a local convenience store or crossing the highway to the Athens Sportsplex.

Thanks to a grant from the Alabama Department of Transportation, the safety issue for pedestrians will soon be solved. The City Council voted unanimously Monday to accept a \$640,000 grant from ALDOT to help build a sidewalk down Elm Street in between Garrett Drive and U.S. 31.

The city will contribute \$160,000 to the project in an 80-20 match for a total of \$800,000.

"In 2017, we had a fatality here with someone on a bicycle," Athens Mayor Ronnie Marks said. "Even before then, we knew this was a dangerous area. There are people that walk to a local store, and they have nowhere to walk."

Marks said Elm Street is now part of Alabama 99, which is a state highway. That meant the City of Athens was required to work with the state before a sidewalk could be put in.

The project will include a pedestrian bridge that spans Swan Creek, meaning pedestrians will no longer have to walk along the roadway to get across.

There have been incidents involving people trying to cross the creek in the past as well.

"It is huge," said Capt. Anthony Pressnell with Athens Police Department. "We have kids that walk in this area that go to the high school. It will get them off the edge of the road onto a sidewalk, where they are a lot safer. We can't wait for this to get started and be completed."

Pressnell said Elm Street is one of the busiest roads in the city, and people walk along this stretch of it at all hours of the day. He said the 2017 fatality happened around 10 p.m.


According to APD, there have been 152 accidents in this area of Elm Street since 2007.

"ALDOT has been aware this is a dangerous area, and we want to thank them and Gov. (Kay) Ivey for their support," Marks said.

Public Works Director James Rich said going through the design, bidding and construction process should take about three years. According to the City of Athens, the sidewalk project will benefit more than 200 apartment units, including students who walk to school and clients of the Mental Health Center of North Alabama.

"This will help protect students who walk to Athens High and Athens Middle School and will make it safer for residents who walk to nearby stores," Marks said. "After this project, we can then look for grant funding to continue south on U.S. 31, to connect with our sidewalk project that runs in front of Athens High to Pryor Street."

- \* Laproscopic surgery with typically quick recovery time
- \* Can donate through "Paired Exchange" even if blood type is not the same

# **Silver Shovel Award**

Throughout the spring months, Spire presents the Silver Shovel award to Alabama municipalities which had no at-fault damages to Spire's infrastructure over the past calendar year.

To be awarded, a municipality must be located within Spire's service territory, in good standing of Alabama 811, and have no at-fault damages to Spire's facilities in 2023. Spire's Damage Prevention and Right of Way teams created the Silver Shovel award in 2019 to encourage municipalities in the company's service territories to work safely when digging around natural gas facilities.

This year's winners are Montgomery, Weaver, Northport and Satsuma. The cities of Weaver and Satsuma are the only two in the state that have received the award for four consecutive years. Congratulations to the communities who won a 2023 Silver Shovel award!
